Board and Committee Reports

THE EDITOR'S KEYBOARD: Linda Parker

Aiming at becoming a leaner yet more valuable and efficient organization, WSAA Board has had discussions targeting methods of saving money on some operations and possibility of increasing income so that the funds can be applied to operations of importance to the association and our members.

Almost two years ago, we trimmed the printing and mailing cost associated with our official publication - The Quiver by posting every monthly issue online and only producing a physical document quarterly. Along with the process (and partially caused by reduction of Club and Shop events due to COVID) we have found less relevant material to print. Fewer events mean less need for advertising flyers, tournament reports, and promotion of coming attractions. Adding to reduced relevance, most Clubs and Shops have active Facebook pages where activities are covered in near real time.

So, at the second quarter WSAA Board of Directors meeting, we addressed possibility of further reduction to the level of only PRODUCING The Quiver once a quarter. The additional savings reaped by paying the Quiver Editor contract only four payments of \$500 (total of \$2000) instead of 12 payments (total \$6000). We posted a poll on the WSAA Facebook page, and 67% were in favor of quarterly publication. Knowing that proportion may be skewed by the nature of respondents (they are all people who are on Facebook and subscribe to the WSAA Page) I'm submitting this subject in The Quiver for September and the October issue (one we still print and mail) to see if others have enough response to sway the balance.

On another (but related) subject: with less frequent publication, planning and publicity for your events will become even more important. Any advertisement you wish to place will need to be submitted even further in advance, to get it placed in one of the four editions produced. An event in March or early April should be advertised in the January issue for example. As an additional point, advertisements being posted on Facebook and shared (sometimes very widely) make it even more important to ensure all the relevant information is fully stated and communicated clearly. For example, one of the Facebook groups I subscribe to (Archery Shoots) posts flyers for events across the nation and even in other countries. Posts may be shared and re-shared multiple times thereby losing connection to the Club or Shop which originally posted. Based on experience, here is some information that should be on every flyer (some of which is often omitted):

Host Club or Shop Name

Location (include City and State, as the same Club name may exist in multiple states)

Date (include the YEAR - your flyer may be posted on bulletin boards or shared in multiple locations)

Format (3D or paper, marked or unmarked, number of targets per day, number of arrows per target)

Whether there will be awards (and if so, what divisions / styles are recognized)

Registration (online or onsite) and whether casual, assigned time, or shotgun start

Contact information (name, phone, email)

Facebook page or Website with functioning link for additional information

Extra considerations (Raffles and door prizes, novelty shoots, dinner, snacks and refreshments, camping) In addition, when preparing a flyer.

Ensure all info will be large enough to read (minimum 10 point font recommended, 12-14 point even better)

Pay attention to color and contrast - some may want to print your flyer with a b/w printer

Be careful about distractions - graphics and photos are attractive, but text placed on top of a photo may be unclear AND BE SURE to CHECK YOUR SPELLING!

TOURNAMENT COMMUNITY NEWS

MEET THE SHELFERS

If you've shot any local, state, or national tournaments, there's a good chance that you've run into Bob or Charlene Shelfer. These septuagenarian barebow recurve archers travel the country to ply their hobby. They've participated in state tournaments throughout Washington and Oregon and in national tournaments in Arizona (Arizona Cup), Florida (Gator Cup and National Senior Games), California (SoCal Showdown), in Utah (Huntsman World Senior Games) and at the Vegas Shoot. They don't limit themselves to just one type of tournament, either, having shot several field, safari, and target tournaments. When asked their favorite type of event, they both gave the edge to safari shoots.

Prior to taking up archery, Bob, who was a Viet Nam War paratrooper, and Charlene, a registered nurse, were into outrigger canoe racing in the Portland area and also in Hawaii and British Columbia. Looking for a less-rigorous pastime in retirement, the couple took up archery about 12 years ago. They each started with an Olympic Recurve style of bow because they liked the way it looked. They soon discovered Archery World in their hometown of Vancouver, received a lot of advice from the staff there, and participated in the shop target league from October through March. They went to their first Vegas Shoot in 2011 and were hooked. Charlene switched to barebow recurve five years ago, and Bob followed suit about three years ago, both liking the simplicity of that style.

The Shelfers are an example that you don't need a sizable plot of property to hone your archery craft. They live in a residential area, so their primary practice consists of shooting in their garage into a stack of hay bales. For outdoor practice, they are members of Sylvan Archers and Chinook Archers. A highlight this year for Charlene was being selected for USA Archery's USAT (U.S. Archery Team) for Master Barebow.

During indoor season, look for the Shelfers at one of the Archery World League venues and USA Archery Indoor Nationals in Salt Lake City. When asked for advice to new archers, Bob said, "To become the best archer you can be, you need the best coach you can afford. Archery, like swimming, is much more complicated than just shooting arrows."

DAY HIKING ESSENTIALS - Contributed by Jenni Bunkelman

Plain Valley Adventure Women serves the area just north of Leavenworth, WA with summer and winter programs supporting the kids' Nordic ski team, so that all kids should be able to do this sport. PVAW does activities every Wednesday, i.e. eBiking, nature sketching, river kayaking, mushroom hunting, glass blowing etc. Every Friday we go for a hike within an hour of our town. This list was provided to the group. This year, there have been numerous "dehydration and unpreparedness" rescues by local agencies. Even for a four-hour hike you might need some of these things.

Comfortable hiking shoes/boots with good tread Comfortable backpack that fits your essentials

Proper clothing for weather conditions -

Layer clothes, avoid cotton

Rain gear

Puffy coat, warm hat and gloves

Hat, sunscreen, sunglasses, lip balm

Bug repellent

First aid kit with basics- bandages, butterfly closures, dressings, adhesive tape, antibiotic ointment, antiseptic wipes, mole skin, nitrile gloves, ibuprofen, Tylenol, antihistamine.

Knife

Waterproof matches / lighter in waterproof container

Head lamp with extra batteries

Water bottle

Basic filter straw

Sitting mat

Navigation - compass and online navigation app

Map of hike

Emergency blanket

Walking poles

Extra food

Bear Spray that's easily accessible in side pocket of backpack.

Navigation Apps

Washington Trails Association - provides the best trail descriptions of all sites. The limiting factor is that it doesn't have trail navigation. Free to use, donation to the nonprofit would be great.

AllTrails - If you get the "Pro", it allows you to use navigation. This is great, but you have to know how to use it! It also provides some trail descriptions.

Gala GPS- great navigation

Maps.me - Free App. Must download maps before you use it. I have found it the easiest to use.

Green Maps - use to be available at Plain Hardware. REI has them.

It's always important to have a backup hard copy map!!!

Other Helpful Apps

Peak Finder - names the mountain peaks based on GPS. Free

Flower Identification and Garden - Free, not a photo identification app

Merlin Bird ID - Free App for bird Identification.

Safety Measures:

Always have a preplanned destination. Have a backup copy of map.

Be sure your cell phone is charged.

For any wilderness hiking, notify family / friends about your plans so if you don't come back within a certain time frame, they can notify the Sheriff.

If someone is injured on the trail, assess the degree of injury. If the person can be assisted with support from two people, begin walking back to the car. If the situation is a true life / death emergency, call 911. A 911 call can usually go through with one bar. If no cell coverage, try moving to higher elevation, often you can get cell coverage.

If you see a black bear or cougar, they usually want nothing to do with you! Make noise and, back up. If it comes towards you, make lots of noise and put arms up to look big. Have bear spray in hand and ready to spray. Do not turn and run away from either animal! They will more likely run after you. Never get between a momma bear and her cubs! It's very rare for either animal to attack. You are more likely to get hit by a car or other worse thing than be killed by a bear or cougar!

This time of year, many of us find ourselves (or lose ourselves) in the outdoors. Unexpected turn of events may leave you outdoors longer than you had planned. Being prepared will prevent a setback from becoming a disaster.



WSAA Target Championship

The official rules of the NFAA govern this tournament except as noted.

The Target Championship consists of two NFAA 900 Rounds shot over two days. This is 90 arrows per day, 30 at each of three distances determined by Division, at a standard 122 cm target face. The Tournament Director may allow two 5-ring targets to be used on one target mat if all archers on that target agree, or may adjust target assignments to accommodate the target size preferences.

NFAA Divisions (including PeeWee) are recognized, and NFAA equipment rules apply to all styles.

All competitors must be current members of the WSAA and either the NFAA or USAA. Non-members are welcome to shoot as Guests, but, as such, will not be eligible for awards.

The round consists of 30 arrows at each of the three distances, 5 ends of 6 arrows each, for a total of 90 arrows.

Adults, all Seniors, and Young Adults shoot at 60, 50 and 40 yards; Youths shoot at 50, 40 and 30 yards; Cub distances are 30, 20 and 10 yards; PeeWee will shoot at 15, 10 and 5 yards. There is a 5-minute time limit per end.

The winners are the archers with the highest score in each division and style and awards will be presented according to the unit rule.



NASP Committee Report September 2022

We are concluding a quiet but busy summer and launching a new school year with a lot of activity.


In July, Linda Parker conducted a Basic Archery Instructor (BAI) at Pleasant Valley School in Vancouver. This school has been presenting archery lessons through their Outdoor Education Camp, but has had turnover of staff and requested training on campus. The class was held outdoors in their covered play area. During August Stephanie Rustad (NW NASP Regional Assistant) taught a class at Assumption Catholic School, also to train replacement teachers to maintain their program. Linda presented a BAI at Grays Harbor Bowmen primarily for teachers at Steilacoom High School, a new JROTC school in Pierce County. And coming up, another class at GHB for Girl Scout leaders from the Western Washington council.

If you want to become a certified Basic Archery Instructor, see the NASP BAI website (www.NASPBAI.org) to check the schedule. OR, if your Club or Shop would be willing to host a class, contact either Linda Parker (west) or Karen Palmer (east) to set a date. The hybrid format class combines four hours asynchronous online (watching videos and passing the exam) followed by a four -hour in-person field day for review, range familiarization, shooting and coaching practice, and peer-teaching practical exercise. Every Club or Shop should have a few instructors among their membership to meet the demand for beginning archery lessons.

We are starting the new year with four new schools: Westgate Elementary and Sage Crest Elementary in Kennewick, Pathfinder K8 in Seattle, and Lynden Academy in Lynden, and are already working with two additional schools in the Grant Request / NASP School Agreement / Order Preparation process.

Looking forward, October will see NASP presented with an exhibit table and a demonstration range / lesson at the SHAPE (PE Teachers) Conference at Highline High School in Burien. And on 10 October we will conduct our first NASP Equipment Maintenance Workshop.

This element of our mission continues to grow, and we would welcome additional people to get involved to support the frequent requests we receive for training and special events (like a Sports Day at Immanuel Church in Hoquiam).


